Concept Note

“Women and the Transmission of Knowledge in pre-modern Islamic Societies: Muftis, Muhadithat and Faqihat”

The presentation highlights the role of women in the transmission of Knowledge in pre-modern Islamic societies. Women in these Islamic societies had a definite participatory role, as well as an active historical presence in the fields of theology and religious sciences. They participated in the transmission of religious knowledge and scholarship, through the teaching of these sciences and were present among the intellectual elite as muftiyat, faqihat, and muhaddithat. The focus of the presentation is not the ‘representation’ of the ‘feminine’ in religious texts, but rather Muslim women as historical agents, as subjects, not objects. It focuses on their contribution to the field of religious knowledge. In what way did they have access to knowledge and what was their role in its transmission?

The space of historical documentation afforded to women, in general, was not equal to male elites connected with state authority and official institutions of knowledge ‘madrasa’. However, information can be found, either in biographical dictionaries that record the lives and deaths of prominent figures in special categories and professions or can be ‘hunted’ and ‘dug out’ from other types of historical sources. The methodology followed for this research is content analysis of the above sources and the discourse embedded in them.

Dr Hoda El-Saadi

Adjunct Assistant Professor, American University in Cairo (AUC)

Prof. Dr. Albrecht Fuess studied History and Islamic Studies at Cologne University and Cairo University. He obtained his Ph.D. in Cologne in 2000 with a dissertation on the history of the Syro-Palestinian coast in Mamluk times (1250-1517). Since 2010 he has been a Professor of Islamic Studies at the University of Marburg.

OIB-COSIMENA Research Colloquium II

In the first joint colloquium in 2023-2024, the research focus was on new approaches to religious ethics, which was divided into three sections (gender, environmental and biomedical ethics). The 12 lectures were held by Egyptian and German scholars. Attention was paid to the plurality of perspectives: man - woman, Muslim - Christian, Sunni – Shiite, and Catholic - Orthodox - Evangelical. The contributions of the 12 scholars will be published in an anthology in autumn 2024. The success of the colloquium was confirmed by various indicators, in particular the great interest of the audience and the interest of the carefully selected speakers in taking part.

The OIB (Cairo Office) is organizing a new series in cooperation with the DAAD Regional Office Cairo in the period between June 2024 - April 2025 on a new topic, namely “Knowledge transfer, its history and its future in the age of digital humanities” or briefly “Knowledge transfer between history and innovation”.

In the new series, the topic will also be treated in an interdisciplinary manner from different perspectives, namely history, religious studies, sociology, modernity and computer science.

This time also, there will be three clusters of 4 lectures each. The first cluster addresses the question of what knowledge transfer is. The second focuses on the questions of how, why and by whom. The final cluster will address modern times. The following dates are planned for the events:
